

plan.

TB DRIVE UNDERWAY AT BLYTHEWOOD

The students of Blythewood School are cooperating whole-heartedly in the Tuberculosis Drive. The majority of the students have contributed to this worthy cause and it is probable that more will contribute before the deadline.

More than one-half of all city dwellers have been at some time infected by tuberculosis, although the disease may have remained quiescent. This fact shows the terrible frequency of the disease, but also brings the comforting thought that the human body, with its wonderful faculty of adjusting itself to new conditions, frequently succeeds in overcoming it. In 1900. 200 out of every 100,000 people in the United States died of tuberculosis, but in less than three decades the rate was cut to 80 out of the same number. This is due not only to the growing immunity of city populations, but to better living conditions, control of the milk supply, and more knowledge of the disease and the methods of treating it.

Its spread is checked by fire

clinics and sanitariums. The National Tuberculosis Association raises several million dollars every year by selling its famous Christmas seeds to blot out this terrible disease.
